A Tour for the Alpine Garden Society

A Greentours Itinerary

Day 1
Depart UK/Europe

Day 2 Arrive Seoul and fly to Jeju Island

Due to the nine hour time difference it'll be the next lunchtime before we land in Seoul. We'll then connect with a flight down to Jeju Island arriving there around dusk and making the short transfer to our hotel.

Days 3 & 4 Jeju Island

Jeju is a popular tourist destination due to its subtropical location and a flight from Seoul lands every ten minutes at the airport. The impressive Hallasan National Park protects the interior slopes of the large volcano that is the island. As elsewhere in Korea the national parks have amazing access with superbly built trails and wooden walkways. At Hallasan a walkway takes us amongst fabulous shows of Rhododendron yedoense and Rhododendron mucronulatum and we'll also see Tulipa edulis, Hepatica insularis and Disporum uniflorum. Under an extraordinary forest of Torreya nucifera trees between five hundred and eight hundred years old is a stunning display of Calanthe discolor and Calanthe sieboldii orchids. The extraordinary Cobra Lily Arisaema ringens is abundant under the Torreyas whilst up on the volcano is much Arisaema serratum.

Everywhere in Korea we'll find Asarums. These stunning little plants come in many varieties though few species – the splitters are only just getting hold of them! In the leaf litter alongside the roads of Hallasan we'll find many of these little beauties in flower. We'll search for rare Oreorchis coreana amid forest where Yellow-rumped Flycatcher and Varied Tits provide avian colour.

In the afternoon of Day 4 we'll fly to Gwangju on the mainland where we'll soon notice how much more boreal are the forests than subtropical Jeju as we drive east to Jirisan National Park.

Days 5 & 6(am) Jirisan National Park

Close to our hotel is a beautiful wooded river valley where we can find the simply sensational soft pink *Rhododendron* schlippenbachii. Floriferous Weigela florida is a common shrub and in the understory here we'll find two nice violets, Viola diamantica and Viola verecunda. Carpinus tschonoskii, Broussonetia kazinoki, and the sensational *Prunus* sargentii with abundant white blooms line the river.

Moving up into Jirisan National Park well walk a gently rising trail that winds for several kilometres through the most lovely forests. At this season the bright green fresh leaves of Quercus mongolica and Quercus serrata will only just be emerging. Siberian Blue Robins hop about in the understory whilst Varied Tit and the radiant Narcissus Flycatcher add colour to the boughs. We'll soon notice the attractive bark of Stewartia pseudocamellia whilst Magnolia sieboldii may just have its first blooms on show. As we get higher Abies nephrolepis and Betula ermanii come into their own and under them is a particularly beautiful dark maroon form of Asarum sieboldii. Yellow Caltha palustris blooms with Lilac and pink Corydalis wandoensis and sky-blue Corydalis remota. If there are two genera that really typify Korea's forest understory it is Corydalis and Violas. There are more than fifty species of the latter and surprisingly they are quite distinct from each other, with some truly beautiful species for instance in Jirisan the agraeous white Viola dissecta var chaerophylloides and buttercup-yellow Viola xanthopetela. We'll have entered the sub-alpine zone by now and as we come out into the open on a mountain ridgetop a spectacular sight will greet us - a magnificent display of Rhododendron mucronulatum ablaze with princess-pink blooms. The reason all those other people were on the trail! Not too far from the national park we'll visit an area where the rare Cypripedium japonicum can be found.

During the afternoon of Day 6 we'll drive almost to the east coast and the green city of Gyeongju where if time permits we'll visit the impressive temple complex at Bulguksa. The track to the temple is lined with huge Zelkova serrata trees. Siberian Chipmunks scurrying among the visitor's feet, they are very tame here. Growing on the banks are abundant Chrysospleniums, Streptopus, Adoxa moschatellina and two large yellow Corydalis – Corydalis speciosa and Corydalis heterocarpa.

Days 7 – 10(am) Ulleungdo Island

Wonderful Ulleungdo Island will be a tour highlight. Think of Clovelly (or perhaps Boscastle) dropped into the middle of the Sea of Japan and sprinkled with a liberal dash of mystery. It is certainly a unique place with a character all of its own. Dark cliffs rise abruptly out of the Sea of Japan to a mountainous interior with all manner of endemic plants.

We start though with the ferry journey from the east coast on the morning of Day 7. The ferries these days are modern, fast and enclosed. The seas in this part of the world can be flat calm, or really quite tumultuous! If calm we can watch out for Dolphins and Whales as we go and if its wavy we'll see abundant Streaked Shearwaters and other seabirds as we peek out the windows. On the island we'll head for lunch in Sadong before visiting the botanically rich woodlands at Jeodong-ri on the trails to the Bongrae Falls. Here amongst forests of Acer pictum var. okamotoanum, Pinus parviflora and Tilia insularis we'll find plenty of gorgeous deep red Camellia japonica in bloom. Abundant and diverse ferns such as Arachniodes standishii and Polystichum retrosopaleaceum line the path and growing amongst them are elegant white bloomed Trillium tschonoskii, Disporum

sessile, the impressive Gymnadenia camtschatica, and lots of the Cobra Liliy Arisaema robustum. Violets include the lovely Viola papilionacea and deep purple-blue Viola seoulensis. There's Arabis takesimana and Corydalis filistipes, both known only from the island. Schizophragma hydrangeoides clambers up the maples and Ilex integra. On the coast below is some spectacular scenery with high rocky pinnacles and stacks arising from the waves. Slaty-backed Gulls and Harlequin Ducks can be seen and on the roadside cliffs the endemic Sedum takesimense.

We'll spend a whole day in the north of the island where vibrant green slopes descend from the island's highest peak, Seonginbong, in a series of ridges cloaked in largely untouched forests. A beautiful trail takes us up to the mountain top with lovely plants everywhere. Low down we'll find colonies of *Lathraea japonica* colonising the trackside under *Fagus mutinervis* and amongst swathes of *Maianthemum dilatatum* whose foliage dominates the ground cover as a swirling mass of geometric greenery.

Nearing the mountain top (Seonginbong is almost 1000m high) the understory is still in early spring and feels much more 'northern'. Here we'll find the well-named Hepatica maxima. Here we enter a beguiling woodland of Acer pseudosieboldianum subsp. takesimense and Viburnum furcatum with its very beautiful spring foliage. Unusual ferns such as shapely Adiantum pedatum and the grape-fern Botrychium ternatum emerge from leaf-litter where we'll find Arisaema japonicum var. takesimense with its distinctly variegated leaves, and a range violets including Viola takeshimana, endemic Viola woosanensis, delicate roundflowered Viola verecunda and a lovely form of Viola dissecta var chaerophylloides.

Day 10(pm) & 11 Woljeongsa Buddhist Temple & Fir Tree Forest in Odaesan

A ferry takes us back to the mainland but this time much further north, to the port of Gangneung, from whence we'll make the two-hour journey to the Inje Speedium Hotel Resort. This is a rather odd but very comfortable place – the hotel overlooks, as its name suggests, a large racing circuit! Odd because its right out in the middle of nowhere and is surrounded by beautiful forests full of flowers! There will not be any racing while we are there, but we will be able to walk out into the forest directly from the hotel door and enjoy such beauties as blue *Iris rossii* and the exceptional *Viola variegata*, one of the most gorgeous of all violets. A most unusual bulb under the forest here is *Heloniopsis koreana*.

Odaesan Mountain is the holy mountain of Manjusri, the bodhisattva of wisdom and intellect. On its slopes Master Jajang, who met Manjusri in person at Taewha Lake in Odaesan, started building the wonderful Woljeongsa Buddhist Temple in 643, in part to enshrine the Buddha relicts given to him by Manjusri. Today we find a sublimely beautiful temple complex, in a most gorgeous setting with fine forest in all directions. The forest floor under Odaesan's glorious fir forests offer a kaleidoscopic show of spring colour. The

ground is thick with blooms! sunny yellow Hylomecon vernalis making a colourful pastiche amongst hordes of Corydalis – blue Corydalis ambigua and Corydalis grandicalyx, yellow Corydalis speciosa and white Corydalis maculata. The nodding bright pink heads of Erythronium japonicum emerge from a sea of yellow Chrysosplenium ramosum. We'll see the fabulous yellow and white blooms of Iris odaesenensis, blue Gentiana zollingeri, Pseudostellaria davidii, Isopyrum raddeanum, and the large-flowered 'sage' Meehania urticifolia with two lines of purple-pink spots down a lip tipped with a beard. There's also elegant Oxalis obtriangulata the white petals traced with fine red lines, and Violas ...

Day 12 – 14 DMZ & Seoraksan National Park

The Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) in the north of the country protects a broad swathe of beautiful mountainous country where there has been little disturbance for more than half a century. The rich boreal forests are home to over fifty species of tree including Quercus mongolica, Quercus variabilis, Phellodendron amurense, Larix kaempferi and Pinus koraiensis. We'll find lovely lilac blooms of Jeffersonia dubia, soft furry vinous Pulsatilla cernua, delicate pink Primula sieboldii, the startling orange-red flowers of Chaenomeles sinensis, and Iris odaesanensis, a delicate beauty whose white flowers are traced with gold. In recognition of the importance of this region's flora the DMZ Botanic Garden was set up just a few years ago under the aegis of Korea National Arboretum in Seoul. This is a marvellous place to see the full range of species found within the area, much of which is of course still of-piste for the casual visitor. We'll take a walk round the garden which will be full of irises, including the yellow Iris koreana, Pulsatillas, and the like. Oreorchis patens, Orchis cyclochila and the fabulous pink slippers of Cypripedium macranthos can be found in the bogs of Mount Dosolsan just behind the botanic garden, the latter though will probably only just be in bud. Here also are Eranthis stellata, Viola diamantica and Trillium kamtschaticum.

Not far north of the botanic garden is a beautiful river gorge. Long-tailed Goral can be seen on the wooded rocky slopes, and some even wander around the carpark. Rhodendrons bloom in profusion along the river banks reminding one of the Oleander-laced rivers of the Eastern Mediterranean whilst under the forests are Arisarums, Paris tetraphylla, frilly Viola tokubuchiana, the stunning Dicentra spectabilis, Corydalis lineariloba and lovely Paeonia lactiflora.

During the afternoon of Day 14 we'll make the three-hour journey to the nation's capital Seoul.

Day 15 Depart from Seoul

After a leisurely breakfast we'll depart Seoul Incheon International Airport at lunchtime and arrive back in London by late afternoon!
